She will be speaking about the book's project of rethinking child subjectivity in education and international development research.

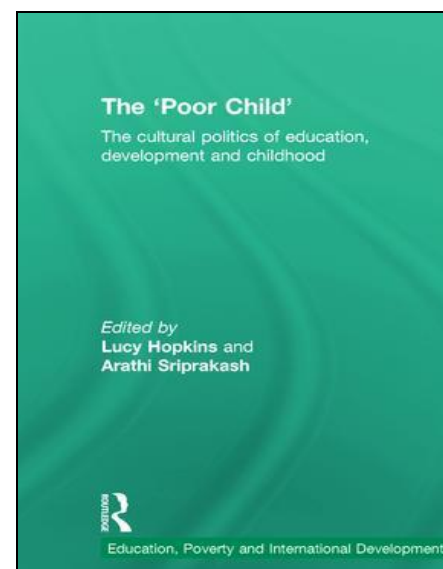
Professor Erica Burman, University of Manchester

Ginny will be sharing recent findings from Young Lives and reflecting on future directions in studies of childhood and global poverty.
